February 2022

There were 79 incidents reported in your area during February.

03/02/2022 08:58 – A single vehicle RTC occurred at Sands Lane roundabout with A165. It appeared as though the vehicle had skidded on some engine oil left on the road. Officers contacted the Highways Agency to clean the road.

07/02/2022 09:16 – A resident had a call from "Kevin at Amazon". Kevin stated that someone had been spending money on the victims account in the USA. The victim checked the account and nothing was missing. The numbers which Kevin the scammer used were 07885729739 & 07890586656. This was a fraudulent call in what was a likely attempt to obtain bank details.

07/02/2022 16:13 – We have received several calls relating to ASB from youths at **Hunmanby Community Centre**. Local Officers are aware of these and have increased patrols. This has also been placed on our local Police briefing for other units from the wider Safer Neighbourhood Team to patrol the area when free.

16/02/2022 14:27 – A report of a fraudulent call is received from a worried resident. Calls were made from 07002544503 / 071759021 (2 digits short) claiming to be from Amazon who said they were going to take £79.99 from her account. The victim contacted their bank who confirmed it was a scam, no money was taken or sent.

17/02/2022 10:45 – A resident received a fraudulent call on their landline whereby the scammer stated they were the fraud department from the bank. They told the victim that their account had been credited with £300 and that £150 of this would need to be transferred abroad. Thankfully, the resident recognised this immediately as a scam and put the phone down. This is the correct course of action, please tell any elderly relatives or vulnerable people to not be afraid to simply put the phone down if they are at all uncertain the call is genuine.

22/02/2022 18:13 – A resident of Hunmanby was riding their push bike on Castle Hill when they had to apply their brakes sharply to avoid a car which was allegedly speeding. The resident fell from their bike, suffering minor injuries in the process. There is no description of the car other than it was 'dark' in colour.

We received 8 reports of concern for safety of individuals in your ward area during February. These incidents invariably relate to people in distress. We work closely with the Street Triage Mental Health Team at Cross Lane who carry Police radios with them, we also have support from Mental Health professionals who work in our control room. This is sadly becoming an increasing trend but we always ensure the people receive the best help available at the time and refer them to other agencies. If necessary, they are referred into the weekly meeting we have with other agencies from around the Borough where we can discuss courses of action to provide best support.

The average time taken to answer 101 calls in February 2022 was 322 seconds.

During February we dealt with 632 incidents across the area as a whole, a breakdown of these follows (not inclusive of all incidents): -

- 4 injury/death RTCs.
- 22 damage only RTCs.
- 31 road related offences, drink/drug driving, no insurance/license/dangerous driving/speeding etc...
- 48 reports of suspicious circumstances.
- 5 missing persons.
- 2 firearms incidents.
- 6 hoax calls.
- 5 Domestic Violence Disclosure Scheme commonly referred to as 'Clare's Law' The Scheme was introduced to set out procedures that could be used by the police in relation to disclosure of information about previous violent and abusive offending by a potentially violent individual to their partner where this may help protect them from further violent and abusive offending.
- 40 domestic incidents/violence.
- 63 concern for safety incidents.
- 7 civil disputes.

- 4 animal incidents
- 12 highway disruptions
- 64 violence crimes.
- 11 sexual offences.
- 21 thefts.
- 0 stolen motor vehicles.
- 9 fraud or forgery.
- 1 drug offence.
- 16 criminal damages.
- 4 dwelling or commercial burglaries.
- 3 auto crimes.
- 58 anti-social behaviour reports.

Please note that in addition to the traditional 999 or 101 we can be contacted on our email address is snafiley@northyorkshire.pnn.police.uk. Please do not report incidents to this email, but if you would like to speak to a member of our team for advice then please use it.

If an incident of Anti-Social Behaviour occurs which you would like Police to deal with then please report this as soon as possible after the event to allow Officers the best chance to deal with the culprits. Please do not wait until next time you happen to bump into an Officer or Parish Councillor. It allows us to make connections with other incidents and deal with individuals for patterns of behaviour rather than incidents in isolation. It does not matter if no suspects have been seen or cannot be identified; we may have this reported on another nearby incident and be able to link them.

Community Safety Advice March 2022

And here we are in March already and wasn't February warm this year; my garden has flowers in bloom that simply shouldn't be yet so not sure how they will fair if we have late frosts and/or snow!

I thought that this time, the subject for my article would be poaching; it's not an "easy subject" and I don't intend to "make light" of such a serious topic as it impacts farmers in so many ways. It creates damage to farm gates, poachers' vehicle (s) can churn up their

crops causing £1000s and £10,000s worth of damage while they gain access to a field and might even include intimidation of the farmer and/or his family/farm workers as they are often armed with shotguns and/or crossbows; poachers often have lurches with them (a dog that looks like a whippet but larger) if they are going after hare/rabbits.

Sadly, the farmers in our surrounding areas, especially Helmsley have been heavily plagued with poachers over the last couple of months and it is never easy to track poachers' movements because they can use false plates and come from outside the area but know it well. So as you can see, it's not just a matter of "oh they're taking a hare or two"- it's so much more, so much more.

So, what can we as individuals to help combat poaching? We all know are own areas better than anyone so when we are out and about, walking, driving or horse riding keep and eye out for any vehicles with lurchers in (the dogs poachers seem to favour) and/or vehicles whereby the occupants are behaving in a suspicious manner and report either via 999 (if taking place) or 101; You can also download the Project Poacher app (see right); however you choose to report, please report it.

The rural area is huge, and the Police need to be able to concentrate their resources so report any and all instance of poaching as soon as possible, giving vehicle details (registration number, make and model and direction of travel if appropriate) number of occupants, whether they have firearms (if you can see) but whatever you do, do NOT approach poachers as you could be putting yourself in harms' way.

What can farmers do to protect their fields? Ensure field boundaries are all secure and if you can, place large heavy obstacles in front of gateways; dig trenches around your fields to deter field entry and install wildlife cameras in order to record evidence – these would need to be night-time cameras in order to pick up evidence from pitch black and read the numberplates. They are not that expensive to buy and if it leads to a conviction, it's one more poacher off the circuit for a while!



If you see a suspicious vehicle in or near farm premises, take note of full details, persons and vehicles, and report to 101 or 999 as they may be scanning properties for farm machinery to steal. Farm equipment thefts, especially quad bikes, can be the "make or break" for a farmer so please do the following – Do = take note of suspicious vehicles/persons and call it in immediately to either 999 or 101

Do = keep yourself at a safe distance from poachers, do NOT approach them in case they

are armed

Do = Help Officers to help you by remaining vigilant and calling any instances in to 999/101

(if you are unsure which number, look at the Police report for information)

And the very best thing you could do is either sign up for the Community Messaging Service (run by North Yorkshire Police) and/or sign up for the Derwent & Hertford Rural WhatsApp Group to keep apprised of crime trends and help yourself and well as others.
